### IWO JIMA'S DE FUSCO AND HYDER; TWO MEN SERVING ON SACRED GROUND

LAWRENCE, METHUEN - Lawrence's Anthony De Fusco 97, and Methuen's Henry Hyder 92, did not know each other until they both recently moved into the same assisted living facility, Methuen Village. However, they share a common bond, both men served on Iwo Jima during World War II. Henry with the Naval Construction Battalions, also

known as Seabees. Tony was in the 4th Marine Division, Iwo Jima was Tony's and the 4th Marines, fourth invasion in the Pacific Theater of the War.

Henry attended high school at Phillips Academy in Andover, Massachusetts. He was drafted shortly after graduating from Phillips. Tony left Lawrence High before graduating and spent the entire war in the Pacific with the US Marines. After the war, Tony became a US Post Office Clerk working in both the "old" and

"new" Lawrence US Post Offices. Henry attended Boston University, and after Boston University, Law school, then going into private Law practice in Methuen. His Methuen practice is still open, now run by one of his sons.

Tony has two brothers and a sister; his wife died a few years ago. Tony also has a daughter, who is a nurse, two sons who are in construction, with six grandchildren. Although his Commanding Officer had not yet told him, he was a Sargent

in the US Marine Corp on the day he was wounded on the Black Sand beaches of Iwo Jima. Tony spoke very fondly of his commanding officer, a US Marine Corp Major Samuel R Petite, who was later killed on Iwo Jima. Tony was able to revisit those same beaches over 30 years ago and pay his respects to those who did not come home.

Henry has two sons, a doctor and a lawyer, four granddaughters and a grandson, he is fortunate enough to have his wife still with him. He is very proud that his son has kept his family law firm open.

Tony (with the rest of the 4th Marines)

participated in the invasions of Kwajalein, Tinian, Saipan, and Iwo Jima as an infantryman. Henry worked as a Construction Electrician with the Seabees, repairing the three captured Japanese Air strips on Iwo Jima. These airstrips were vital to our success in the air war against Japan.

Both men enjoyed golf, Tony playing at Hickory Hill GC and Merrimack GC, once getting a hole in one at Hickory Hill GC. Henry never got a hole in one, however, he recalls that he enjoyed playing at

the Andover Country Club with friends and clients.

Tony was a member of the Knights of Columbus, Henry, like his father before him, was a Mason. We had a nice discussion

on the need for young men to be more engaged today in their communities, and how today's young adults should join civic organizations such as the Knights and the Masons.

Tony talked of going to the Lawrence Boy's Club as a youth and being a member of the "Plainsmen Association" as a young man. In the 1960s urban renewal



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# Why Not Just Let Them All Die?

In the process of posting breaking news on The Valley Patriot Facebook and Twitter pages we often encounter reader comments that evoke serious emotion, discussion, and debate.

Earlier this month, we posted a story of the Lawrence Fire Dept. searching for a reported overdose victim off Manchester Street. First responders searched for the overdose victim so they could administer the drug NARCAN, a substance that literally brings someone back to life after taking a deadly dose of heroin. Eventually they learned that another addict had administered NARCAN and the OD victim went on their way.

Several of our readers took the position that we should not be wasting the time, money, and resources of our police and fire to bring heroin addicts back to life.

“Why not just let them die? They are just going to go out and do it again,” one reader opined.

Still others chimed in saying that those who choose to take drugs are not worth keeping alive, as they are a constant drain on our community, commit crimes, and obviously don't want to get clean anyway.

It's a view that is all too common as our culture struggles to deal with an opioid epidemic that is transforming even the most affluent communities into havens for drug dealers, homelessness, and crime.

Why not let them die?

It's true that most of the homeless addicts (and even the non-homeless addicts) do not want to get help. They are so physically dependent on the heroin or fentanyl, that food and water become secondary needs to getting their next fix.

We see it all too often as police officers sometimes have to administer NARCAN to the same individuals over and over on a daily basis, only to have them go right back out searching again for their next high.

If you talk to most of these individuals they will tell you outright they do not want to go to detox, they do not want to get clean, and they do not want to change the direction of their lives. They just want to get high.

It's a hard fact to wrap your head around, but it only shows the power that heroin and fentanyl have over their minds and bodies.

What we also learn when we talk to these addicts over a period of time, however, is that they are not willing to get help or change their lifestyle ... RIGHT NOW.

At some point, every addict hits rock bottom where they realize they cannot do it anymore. They will then either - kill themselves - or make the decision to reach out to someone for help.

Using NARCAN to bring a dead addict back to life gives these individuals one more day to make that decision. It gives them one more day of life to - maybe - hit rock bottom so they will finally be ready to get clean.

It's frustrating for the families, the police, the fire departments, the EMTs, the hospital workers, and the volunteers in our communities who try every day to get these people the help they need. It's even more frustrating for the uneducated public who bear the expense and the societal effects of so many heroin and fentanyl addicts plaguing their communities.

But, these are human beings. They are someone's daughters, sons, husbands, mothers, fathers, and sadly grandfathers.

As a community we surely need to do

a better job trying to prevent people from taking heroin and other addictive drugs in the first place. But, where we fail to do so, we must also do a better a job of understanding the incredible grip these drugs have over a person's mind and body.

We have to have patience. And if that means administering NARCAN 100 times before a person is ready to get clean, then that is what we have to do. What's more, we have to understand that most addicts fail at rehab half a dozen times before they finally get clean. Failure only means they need to try again. And they need our help to do so. We have to let the addicts know that while they are not ready to change, RIGHT NOW ... when they are ready, help is available.

Sure it's easy to say, 'let them die'.

But, we shouldn't be willing to throw these lives away simply because it is easier for the rest of us - simply because it will save money and resources.

Every life is precious. No matter how hard it is to get the addicts to see the value of their own lives. We have to keep trying!

Otherwise, what have we become as a society? ◇

## Accused Schena Murderer's Haverhill Criminal Past Includes Drugs, Passing Fake Money

In the nine months before Haverhill's Leedell Graham was arrested for the murder of former Groveland building inspector Patsy Schena, Haverhill Police picked him up on two separate occasions for dealing cocaine and passing a counterfeit \$100 bill, WHAV can exclusively reveal.

While living on Beach Street in the city's Mount Washington neighborhood, Graham was sentenced to six months behind bars after trying to use a fake \$100 bill to purchase a "Natty Daddy" beer and Game Green Cigars at Riley's Corner Market. According to Haverhill Police Officer Justin Graham (no relation), Graham said he found the bill while walking to the market. The eagle-eyed clerk knew right away it was a fake.

"The bill was of poor quality and the average person upon seeing the numerous Chinese symbols and inaccuracies of the counterfeit bill, as well as the feel of the paper, could tell the bill was counterfeit," Officer Graham said in his police report from the incident on Sept. 4, 2018.

Three months later, on Dec. 15, 2018, the Haverhill Police Gang Unit encountered Graham in the midst of a drug deal on the city's White Street. Originally

charged with one count of drug distribution, Graham picked up another charge of defacing property when, according to Officer Adam Durkee, he "spit a white substance all over the rear seat and door of the police cruiser," while being transported to the Bailey Boulevard station.

Graham, living on Portland Street at the time of that arrest, was ordered to spend six months behind bars for those offenses.

Both his September and December 2018 cases were heard by Haverhill District Court First Justice Stephen Abany, the same judge who ordered him held without bail on June 28 on one count of murder after Groveland Police say he brutally killed Schena.

A State Police investigation—coupled with evidence found by passersby less than a mile from Schena's home—led officials to determine Schena's death was the result of "blunt and sharp force trauma." The murder weapon is believed to be a lamp.

The men are said to have known each other through business dealings not related to Schena's former role as Groveland's town building inspector, a role he held from 1979-2015.

Graham next appears in court in August.

Sponsors for the Artisan Market at the Mills include the North Andover Merchants Association, RCG, and the East and West Mills. ♦

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

**Methuen Voters Just Don't Care**

Welcome to July with the summer season in full swing.

July is known as the hottest month of the year. Time will tell if it lives up to its expectations this year. The ocean waters will continue to warm as we go through the month of July.

Recapping June, we did see warmer temperatures compared to May. There were still some days when rain occurred. Boston got around five inches for the month, which was 1.42 inches above normal.

Worcester averaged below normal and this shows you now that we are into summer. Not all areas get an equal amount of rain.

During the summer some areas can get heavy rain in a brief period of time and a short distance away could stay dry. This is not like a winter storm when more of a wide-spread area gets rain/snow.

During June some locations saw their first 90-degree temperature on Friday June 28th. Boston Logan Airport did not reach 90 degrees on June 28th nor did it for the entire month of June.

As we went through the later part of June, the Bermuda high pressure system off the east coast started to build and had more of an influence on our weather. In June there was more severe weather and tornadoes over Texas and the plain states.

This was caused due to the clash of two different air masses, hot humid air against cooler less humid air. One of the indicators for thunderstorm development is convective available potential energy (CAPE). If this energy reaches one thousand joules per kilogram, or higher, then severe weather is likely and also the potential exists for tornadoes.

If the air is cold aloft in the upper levels of the atmosphere, then hail can occur with thunderstorms due to the freezing levels being quite low in the atmosphere. We saw this situation on Sunday, June 28th, when hail occurred with the thunderstorms along with gusty winds which caused some trees to fall.

The reason we had cold air aloft was an upper level low pressure system which moved across our area.

There was also a potent upper level disturbance which also moved across our

area. Even though June did not bring us much hot weather this year in our area, it did across the southern states and the SW United States.

The southern states saw 90s in June and the temperatures reached 100 degrees and higher in Phoenix Arizona. For us this year has not been as hot as last year; we will see if this changes in July and August. The number of 80 degree or higher temperatures for Boston has been lower this year

compared to last year this time. Some safety tips for hot weather are as follows: make sure you drink plenty of water and stay hydrated!!!

Wear light weight clothing (shorts) and also light color clothing. Light colors absorb less heat from the sun compared to darker colors. Refrain from strenuous outdoor activities during the heat of the day.

Wait until the sun goes down or also before it rises. DO not leave children and pets in hot cars with the windows closed. Temperatures can rise over 110 and even over 120 degrees inside the car. During the summer months we can get a heat wave which is three or more consecutive days when the temperature reaches 90 degrees or higher.

In summer we are prone to more thunderstorms. Remember if you are outdoors and hear thunder you must seek shelter immediately because the sound of thunder means lightning is close by and can strike you. Danger spots during a thunderstorm are open areas, examples are baseball fields, golf courses, tennis courts and also the beach. Stay away from trees because lightning can hit the top of the tree and can travel down to the ground. After a thunderstorm is over if you see downed power lines stay away and call your utility company. Also, during heavy rain with thunderstorms if you are driving DO NOT drive your car through flooded roads, turn around and proceed the opposite way. Also, this summer if you are at the beach and the ocean is choppy use caution especially when the lifeguards are gone for the day. It is hurricane season however it has been quiet; although in August we will start to see more hurricanes form. Next month we will recap

July's weather and talk more about hurricanes. In the meantime, enjoy summer, stay cool and be safe!!! ◇



Given the enormous conflicts and controversies that have gone on in Methuen over the last two years, you might think that the people of Methuen have had enough. But a quick look at the number of people running for city offices this year shows that they really haven't, and that's tragic.

The City of Methuen is going into state receivership (no matter what they call it) because of financial mismanagement and the inability of Methuen leaders to... well ... lead.

That is very dangerous for our democracy, leads to lower quality of city services and higher taxes for everyone.

HOW BAD IS IT?

The deadline has long past for voters to take out nomination papers to run for office in the November municipal elections.

There are only three candidates running for mayor, four candidates running for three seats in the council at- large race, two city councilors are actually running unopposed in the East End (staggering), three candidates running for two seats in the West End, and five candidates running for six seats on the school committee.

And that's if everyone who took out nomination papers turns them in and qualifies to get on the ballot.

Methuen has a population of approximately 47,000 people and only 5 people expressed an interest in running for 6 seats on the school committee? Only four people are running for three seats in the city council at large (city wide) race? Two councilors running unopposed in the East end?

What a disgrace.

If the past two years of national embarrassment and obvious corruption isn't enough to motivate the people of Methuen to get involved and take control of their city government by running for office, nothing will - and - nothing will ever change. This is the year the people of Methuen should be most active, given that so much is at stake for the future of the city. Over-development, crumbling infrastructure, an increase in violent crime, a school system reeling from the Scannel situation, a police department under fire by the press and the public, budget deficits, unexplained city expenses, what is it going to take?

Shame on the people of Methuen for not getting involved and taking back your city government. I get that it's a thankless job for little or no money. I get that the insiders make it dirty, and personal and you have to make sacrifices just to run a campaign. But, if people do not step up and serve their community in time of crisis like this, things are only going to get worse. The political insider will continue calling the shots. The city will continue to degrade both physically and sociologically.

At this pace the City of Methuen will be in full state receivership (control) in under three years.

# Fighting for Freedom Every Single Day in Dracut

In some towns in Massachusetts, our independence is celebrated on July 4th. In Dracut, there's plenty of opportunities to fight for – and celebrate – freedom all year long. No matter the season, the First Amendment always seems to be the last resort for town government, sadly.

This year, freedom rang loudly and strongly in Dracut on May 2nd. That was the day Jesse Forcier, chairman of the Board of Selectmen, notified the Dracut Republican Town Committee (DRTC) that elected officials had finally taken charge and managed Town Manager James Duggan. As you may remember, Duggan had illegally banned the DRTC from marching in the town's Memorial Day parade in honor of our fallen veterans. Of course, he'd probably like you to forget...

Despite the fact that Selectmen publicly criticized the ban and spoke in favor of letting all town groups march, Duggan dug in and defied his five bosses. He tried to pass the buck to the American Legion and Colleen Garry, Dracut's favorite strip-mall lawyer who provides free services for Post 315. (They definitely get what they pay for – and they deserve better!)

As soon as Duggan revealed on TV that he had contacted the American Legion commander through John Dyer, a Democrat operative and one of Garry's political cronies, the gig was up. When it looks like an inside job and it smells like cow manure, it's dirty politics in Dracut – and Garry isn't usually too far from the stench.

In case you've forgotten, Garry has a history of trying to silence her political opponents and anyone else who disagrees with her. She tried to weaponize the state's campaign finance law, filing a bill to basically shred the First Amendment, silence any criticism of her very pathetic voting record and make sure no one hurts her delicate feelings. But it backfired, big time. Instead of silencing free speech, Garry caused an outcry of opposition to her proposal, with the Lowell Sun, Massachusetts Fiscal Alliance, Boston Herald and Boston Globe all speaking out against her ridiculous and unconstitutional bill. By the way, the irony is that Colleen Garry tried to change the same law she was fined \$5,000 by the state for violating, for failing to keep accurate campaign finance

records for many years, sadly.

Anyway, it's a shame that our veterans were put into the position of being forced to choose sides by Duggan and Garry, who politicized the parade for absolutely no reason other than politics. After all, freedom of speech is not a Republican issue or a Democrat issue; it's an American issue. Our military forces fight all around the world and give the ultimate sacrifice to defend all of us and all our rights, without regard for anyone's political party back here at home.

Ultimately, the government watchdog group Judicial Watch interceded to ensure freedom of speech wasn't trampled by town government and that 22 members, associates and friends of the DRTC were allowed to march. In the end, the town's about-face helped put a face on a group of patriotic citizens who simply wanted to honor our fallen veterans, like everyone else in the town parade.

It wasn't the first time that free speech was hard to swallow in Dracut or the first time Judicial Watch had to get involved to protect the First Amendment in town this year, sadly. At the end of February, Judicial Watch challenged the constitutionality of the town's political-sign bylaw. Initially, the town manager tried to dismiss the issue. Six weeks later, he put an article on the Town Meeting warrant to repeal it in its entirety.

On June 3rd, freedom struck again. Town Meeting voted in favor of the repeal, removing illegal restrictions placed on town residents and political candidates that violated the First Amendment and rulings of the Supreme Court. It wasn't a minute too soon, as the repeal came more than 15 years after the legality of the political-sign bylaw was first challenged in federal court.

Nearly 250 years after our Founding Fathers pledged their lives, fortunes and sacred honor in the name of freedom, it's still worth fighting for. And, in Dracut, it's just as necessary now as it was then. See you on the town battlefield, sadly.

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
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**POLICE AND DA'S NOW CONTROL WHAT YOU KNOW**

John Blodgett, the Essex County DA waited a whole 24 hours or more before holding a press conference on the murder in Groveland last month. Of course by that time, it was barely even news. He has also threatened local police chiefs with jail time if they release booking photos, saying it's against the law, when any thinking person knows that it's not.

Then you have these public relations firms that are the keepers of information, like Guilfoil Public Relations LLC which sometimes pushes our press releases on crime that occurs in the community in a timely manner. Sometimes not so timely. Sometimes not at all. But, whatever they release, it is of course what the police departments want you to know, WHEN they want you to know it. What is happening here is huge and nobody seems to care. Police departments and DAs are controlling the news. And the so called news media is bowing down and taking it. They want to control the message but they are forgetting that they work for us. Yet, if nobody holds them accountable and challenges them, they aren't really working for us at all. They are working for themselves. Add to that the increase in police departments encrypting their scanner transmissions, all the while setting up cameras everywhere so that you ... their BOSS ... you know, like the public ... know nothing about what your public servants are up to except what they want you to know. All the while they can watch and log everywhere you go and everything you do in public. 
**KANNAN SNUBS VALLEY PATRIOT READERS**


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**New England Revolution Honors Hero Kevin Vanderhorst of Lawrence**

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

## Speaker DeLeo Joins State Delegation at Veterans Northeast Outreach Center

In June, we were fortunate to have Speaker of the House Robert DeLeo visit the Veterans Northeast Outreach Center (VNOC) in Haverhill. I invited the Speaker to help highlight the VNOC's exceptional programs and services, which are second to none in caring for our Veterans.

The VNOC, established in 1985, has a staff of 74 employees and offers services to over 50,000 eligible Veterans across the region. Their programs provide food and housing assistance, advocacy, medical referrals, career and educational supports, and more. Of particular note are their wrap-around services, which ensure that our Veterans receive holistic and sustainable support.

The VNOC is also in the process of constructing 44 units of Veterans' housing on the site of the old Gerson Furniture building on Washington Street in Haverhill. This is a major project that will have a real impact on reducing Veteran homelessness in our community.

During the visit, Speaker DeLeo remarked that he considers the VNOC to be a role model in serving the Veteran community. He also voiced his continued commitment to passing Veteran-focused legislation each session to keep Massa-

chusetts #1 in the nation in caring for our Veterans. I look forward to working with the Speaker on this legislation in my role as Chair of the Committee on Veterans and Federal Affairs.

The Speaker has also been very supportive year after year of funding for Veterans' services in the state budget. I thank him for his support of an amendment I filed with the Merrimack Valley delegation to secure an additional \$300,000 for the VNOC in the House budget. If adopted in the final budget, the VNOC plans to use this funding to help Veterans in need who may not be eligible for certain VNOC programs.

We are lucky to have this incredible organization in our community – many thanks to the VNOC team for all of their work. Thanks also to Speaker DeLeo for visiting, and to my colleagues who attended, including Representatives Andy Vargas, Lenny Mirra, Christina Minicucci, and Tram Nguyen, as well as Haverhill Mayor Fiorentini, Haverhill City Councilor Melinda Barrett, and Haverhill Veterans' Service Officer Amanda Buckley.

## Addressing the Opioid Crisis

Hello Valley Patriot Readers,  
Every day we hear a news report or read of a new statistic about the opioid epidemic in Massachusetts. We all know people – loved ones, friends, neighbors or colleagues – who have been affected by addiction.

Here in the Merrimack Valley, I remain committed to addressing the impacts of opioids on our communities. Recently, through the passage of the FY20 Senate Budget, I secured funds toward important initiatives to help beat back this epidemic in our region of the Commonwealth.

Included in the budget is funding to launch a pilot program that will provide transportation services to Merrimack Valley residents seeking treatment at a detoxification or rehabilitation center. The program will provide a 24/7 van service, accessed through an existing Bureau of Substance Addiction Services hotline, to transport persons in need of these services and lessen the burden on volunteers who have historically assisted with the transportation of those seeking treatment.

Additionally, I secured funds for both the Students Against Destructive Decisions (SADD) program at Methuen High School and the Merrimack Valley Prevention and Substance Abuse Project (MVPASAP).

Founded in the 1980s as Students Against Driving Drunk, SADD initially focused on addressing teen deaths from drinking and driving. Now, SADD focuses on the prevention of all destructive behav-

iors, including substance use, depression and suicide.

MVPASAP is an organization committed to ending the stigma of addiction and engaging public and private community members to work together in promoting awareness, education, prevention, and treatment of substance use in our communities.



With the help of additional funds, both the SADD program and MVPASAP can continue their important work.

Beyond the budget, I am working to gather momentum and support around several bills pertaining to addiction, including legislation - Senate Bill 272 - to ex-

pand substance use education and heroin diversion programs in public schools.

While we have made great strides in recent years toward assisting those struggling with addiction, we need to do even more in educating our youth to prevent them from ever reaching that point. It is critical that we connect with young people in our communities early on in their adolescence, as younger teenagers who try drugs or alcohol are more likely to struggle with substance use later on in life. We must stay vigilant.

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



## Boston Land Company Sets the Record Straight on Museum Square Garage

The Boston Land Company sent a letter to tenants of Museum Square in Lawrence addressing the issue of the parking garage that has been the subject of such controversy.

Dear Museum Square Residents:

Since the condemnation and closing of the Museum Square Garage, there has been a great deal of misinformation coming from City Officials and the press about the financial relationship between Museum Square Apartments and the City of Lawrence regarding the garage. This is to help clarify and accurately describe the facts surrounding the garage.

In the 1980's, Museum Square Apartments was built under the MassHousing SHARP Program which helped create mixed income affordable housing.

As part of the apartments, the City leaders wanted a city owned garage to help revitalize the urban downtown.

At that time, the Commonwealth of Massachusetts offered a program to build city-owned garages whereby the State paid 75% of the cost, as a grant (it does not need to be paid back), and the City had to pay 25% of the costs.

The City had no money to cover their portion (25%) of the cost.

Museum Square Apartments contributed over \$1,200,000.00 towards the cost of the garage to cover the City's portion.

Museum Square Apartments financed the additional \$1,200,000.00 in the apartment building loan.

Resident's rent payments and parking payments go towards paying the debt

(mortgage) of the Museum Square Apartments and that includes the construction costs of the Garage.

The Garage was handed over the City free and clear, owing no debt. The garage was built for FREE for the City.

An Agreement was put in place to secure parking for the residents of Museum Square Apartments.

The City is responsible for the maintenance and operation of the Museum Square Garage since it owns the garage. The City collects other parking fees from the public to cover these costs.

In 2012, the former Mayor tried to end the Agreement that was in place. The Superior Court determined Museum Square Apartments is in compliance with the agreement and Museum Square Apartments WON the judgement. Museum Square Apartments has a permanent injunction that the City MUST comply with the Agreement. This agreement secures a certain number of parking spaces for the Museum Square Apartments Residents.

The Boston Land Company does NOT own Museum Square Apartments. The Boston Land Company is the management agent.

To date, not one City Official has reached out to us to discuss this issue.

We want to assure all our residents that our legal right to convenient parking is very important. Be assured that we are working to find a proper resolution to this issue.

## Three People From Lawrence Arrested In NH State Poice- FBI Operation

On June 19, 2019 at approximately 2:15 pm The New Hampshire State Police Mobile Enforcement Team, (MET), was working a joint drug investigation in conjunction with the FBI Safe Streets Taskforce.



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## Former Vietnam Nurse from Lawrence Volunteers Still

Kathleen Benson, a young woman from a working-class family in Lawrence, in the mid-nineteen-sixties, typically wouldn't have a lot of travel and adventure opportunities. But this one ended up in a formerly beautiful French colonial coastal city, surrounded by the mountains of Viet Nam, exactly 50 years ago this month: Da Nang.

While most heroic people go to wars to fight an enemy, this young woman left behind all the comforts of a normal life, willingly, to confront the war in a different way. She objected to the war by immersing herself in it, serving as a nurse in the 95th Evacuation Hospital, as a 1ST Lt. Her personal mission was to save lives. She was shocked by the oppressive heat, noise, dust, the sound of distant, muffled explosions and Chinook



helicopters that brought in the wounded day and night. But her determination to endure and serve with excellence prevailed.

Nurses in war zones are not recruited, nor drafted; they end up there by volunteering. After completing her studies as a nurse at age 20, she worked at Walter Reed Hospital, Bethesda, MD - learning her medical craft - until her petition to be shipped out to a war zone at the acceptable minimum age of 21 was approved.

But her training became more urgent when young soldiers of similar ages were brought in on gurneys tethered to the back of jeeps or open sides of helicopters, with bloodied stumps, facial, head and bodily wounds. Her understanding of the fragility of life was greatly accelerated relative to her young age as she confronted death, dying and disabling conditions first hand.

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## “Grindr App Hinders LGBTQ Users Mental Health”

There are approximately 394,000 adults in the state of Massachusetts that identify as gay, lesbian, bisexual or trans. Making us the second gayest state in the nation, according to a report by the Boston Indicators and Fenway Institute.

A 6.4% of the state's self-identified queer population resides in the Essex County; hence discussing the LGBTQ community's mental health in local venues is imperative. Given that this group carries adverse life experiences and traumas attached to their sexuality, but also considering that in our society's infrastructure, there are factors of the heteronormative, imploding the wellbeing of its members. Furthermore, even when platforms that were originally created to facilitate same sex dating-oriented-interactions, serve to harm its participants' dignity, such as is the case of the phone application Grindr.

Grindr is a hook up app —part of the mobile dating market—, belonging to an industry that profits off the pursuit of romantic relationships and sexual interactions. Just in 2019 this trade has had 3 billion in revenue with an annual growth on 11%, according to an IBIS World Industry Report. Such serves as a direct incentive for the app to have a low social responsibility at regulating its operations.

The application, which is branded towards the gay man usage, promotes habits of impersonal, casual-sexual encounters; a culture in which users categorize themselves based on their body type. Promotes a hierarchy based on weight and body built —opening way for body shaming. A hypersexualized sphere that dissuade users from promoting positive and healthy human relationships. A setting that fosters patriarchal discrimination within the gay community itself, in which positive value is added to being masculine and negative to being effeminate, openly. And one in which if you are a gay Asian man, you are publicly disregarded to a less desirable status, with certain users perpetrating racial bias alongside profile biographies, stating: “Not into Asians.”

According to the Clinical Social Worker

and Therapist Michelle S. Wexelblat:

“Grindr users misunderstand the app's purpose. This mobile application was created to facilitate hook-ups. Yet users are seeking emotional support on mechanical sexual interactions, confuse validation with attraction and think that they will build a connection on affirmation —they often lack from relatives and friends— on a one-night stand. This behavior can lead to the feeling of loneliness and emptiness, especially, when a significant amount of LGBTQ community members, has built tools to adapt to dysfunctional situations, that cannot effectively operate in healthy ones. This leads to feelings of isolation and guilt, that are preambles of depression.”

In MA there were 608 successfully completed suicides during 2014, with a 54% of the victims possessing documented and current mental health problems; and in 2015, 631 cases of suicide deaths, with a 55% of documented mental health conditions, according to the state's Department of Public Health. A 40% of the LGBT population in Massachusetts has been diagnosed with depression, according to a surveillance conducted by Maria McKenna, PhD within 2011 and 2016, making it a high-risk community to suicide attempts.

Despite same-sex marriage was ruled constitutional nationwide in 2015, providing legal protection to an underserved and discriminated demographic, with second class citizenship status, one would think this measure would be the final milestone for equality. Yet the amendment did not fix the different types of judgements gay men are able to inflict against each other, many times as a result of inner wounds. Neither gave individual protection from a different array of institutionalized incurrences, that are a determining factor towards higher suicides rates as: lack of representation and institutionalized misogyny.

Fortunately, a bill was enacted in the U.S. Congress titled the “Equality Act” that seeks to amend the Civil Rights Act, at prohibiting discrimination based on sexual orientation, gender identity and biological sex. Legally protecting sexu-

# The Meaning of Liberty

As another Independence Day has come and gone, Americans had an opportunity again to reflect on the meaning of July 4th. Traditionally, we have self-identified as a nation of freedom and liberty. Yet, as we move further and further in time from the writing of the Declaration of Independence, two movements have come to obscure this national identity – one from the left and the other from the right.

The American Left celebrates Independence Day with an underlying anger. The focus is not on who enjoys liberty, but on who does not. This begins with the African slaves and continues with all consequent discrimination. It is true the U.S. has not been immune to fallen man's tendency to protect what is his and exert power over the new guy. In this sense America has always been a class society; the newest migrants being at the service of those who came before them, financially and socially. While the Irish, Greeks, Italians, etc. were discriminated against when they first immigrated to America, after a couple generations they acculturated enough to share in its middle class dream. Two ethnic groups today, however, continue to sense a glass ceiling that is not being broken. With the help of the media and the Democratic Party, Blacks and Hispanics are openly encouraged to harbor animosity against 'white people'. Just watch CNN or MSNBC for 30 minutes and you'll see it. Democratic policies, which have demonstrably failed the poor, keep these groups dependent on politicians. This is why people like Ben Carson and Candace Owens are seen as great threats to their power.

On the other hand the American Right also has warped the definition of liberty. Before modern philosophy began distorting it, individual liberty meant the 'free-

dom to do the good' or what one ought to do (i.e. the right thing). It has evolved, however, to correspond more to our selfish nature by becoming 'freedom to do what we want' – as long as it doesn't hurt anybody. This definition of liberty, with which everyone is familiar today, gives rise to the ethical theory consequentialism, which looks solely at the potential consequences of an act as the standard by which to judge right and wrong. Instead of asking "Is this act good?" the question becomes, "What harm does it do?" This turning of liberty's meaning is accompanied with suspicion of government. Hence, the right's expectation can be summed up in the maxim that if there is no apparent harm to another, one has a right to do it - and government should not interfere. Liberty, therefore, becomes the freedom to watch pornography, do hard drugs, and manipulate other people's weaknesses for profit. After all, the thinking goes, as long as there is consent and no one is physically hurt, I am free to do it. This is wrong. It is not liberty, but license.

By the way, the Left concurs with this skewed view of freedom only when it relates to bedroom issues. Other than sexual perversions, the Left seeks more and more governmental involvement in people's lives. Therefore, to the Left, a divorce culture, an abortion culture of 1.3 million prenatal homicides per year, "same-sex marriage", and men calling themselves women is liberty, however, virtually everything else in the public social and economic sphere the Left demands be more government involvement.

Here lies the problem: Liberty, and human rights in general, has to be based on something. It needs a source. That something is not the state or the majority. It is human nature and its intrinsic law. Read Martin Luther King's Letter from

It was all his idea. No. Really. The entire idea of Queen was Freddie Mercury.

Mercury was born on September 5, 1946 in Zanzibar. His real name is Farrokh Bulsara. In 1963, Mercury was living with his relatives in India. While in India, he took piano lessons. At age 12, he formed a group called 'The Hectics'. Although the group didn't last very long, Mercury didn't give up on music. In 1969, he joined several underground groups that died quickly. It wasn't until 1970, that he joined the group 'Smile' with Brian May and Roger Taylor. By 1971, when bassist John Deacon joined 'Smile', the name of the group was changed to 'Queen' by Freddie Mercury.

Queen sent a demo tape to several record companies but were rejected. So, they started working with Trident productions. The deal was that albums would be given to the production company, and the production company would sell the albums to record companies. Since the group had very little money, they recorded songs during the inexpensive night shift.

Putting his art degree to good use, Mercury created the memorable Queen logo. The logo shows the Zodiac signs for each band member. The logo shows two lions hugging the big Q. The lions represent the Leo sign for members Deacon and Taylor. One crab for Cancer member May, is sitting on all of the letters with flames rising above it. Two fairies for Mercury who is a Virgo. Each fairy is sitting under the lions for protection. A large phoenix overshadows the entire logo.

On July 13, 1973 Queen released their first album. This heavy metal album wasn't immediately successful, but it was certified gold in both the UK and the US.

On March 8, 1974 Queen released their

second album simply titled 'Queen II'. This is great if you like horror movies. Two songs that stand out are 'The March of the Black Queen', and 'Seven Seas of Rhye'. 'March of the Black Queen' is a six-minute song. The instrumentation isn't creepy, but the lyrics are. The last song on the album is 'Seven Seas of Rhye'. The first time I heard the song, I thought that Queen was just another demonic heavy metal group from the 70s.

By 1974, Queen had their first US tour. The tour was cut short when Brian May was diagnosed with hepatitis. While May was recovering, the band went into the studio and started working on their next album called 'Sheer Heart Attack'. This is the first album that had radio ready songs like 'Killer Queen', and 'Now I'm Here.'

By 1975, the album 'A Night At The Opera' was released. The album included their staple song 'Bohemian Rhapsody'. The song alone, with the music video, took a long time to record. Both radio and music are magic in that your imagination has no limitations. You can mentally be transported to a bicycle race on a warm day while just sitting in a dark room. With that being said, 'Bohemian Rhapsody' was recorded in four tracks. The result put the listener in danger of going to Hell. Now, let's look at how the memorable video was created seven years before MTV went on the air. To give the illusion that the group was live, a lot of the scenes were shot on a sound stage with a white stage light pointing down at the piano. The special effects were pulled off by just pointing the camera at a television screen and capturing the image. The video was created so that the group wouldn't have to be on the BBC show 'Top of The Pops.'

In 1977, 'News of The World' was

The Primetime Emmy nominations will be announced shortly and every year I like to review the past year in TV and give my Emmy Wish List, my list of who I would like to see recognized. It's always tough to remember all the great work every year, and not everyone can be nominated. Some will be overlooked, but I hope the actors and actresses that I mention here are not forgotten. So here goes...

J.K. Simmons (Counterpart) – The brilliance of J.K. Simmons' performance in the now cancelled 'Counterpart' is easy to see. Simmons plays two versions of the same man, Howard Silk. Two spies living on opposite sides of a parallel dimension. He does such a great job that you can tell which character he is playing without him even uttering a word, just by the mannerisms he uses for each character. It's an amazing performance.

Brigitte Lundy-Paine (Atypical) – Brigitte Lundy-Paine is the best thing about Netflix's autism dramedy 'Atypical.' She plays Casey, the sister of the autistic Sam. Casey balances being Sam's rock, and trying to adjust to a new school, and all the other stuff a teenage girl goes through. Truly one of the breakout performances of the year.

Daniel Levy (Schitt's Creek) – Daniel Levy's role as David on the delightful 'Schitt's Creek' is on the highlights of the TV year. Rhea Seehorn (Better Call Saul) – We finally got to see Bob Odenkirk's Jimmy McGill make the full transformation into Saul Goodman last season. But it was Rhea Seehorn's work as Kim Wexler that continues to impress. The cast of 'Better Call Saul' is so good, that she sometimes gets overlooked. Let's hope she gets recognized this year.

Marc Maron (GLOW) – Maron continues to put in fine work as Sam Silvia, the failed filmmaker who now directs the 'GLOW' TV series. Just like in season 1, the comedian turned actor shows that he's more than capable of touching our hearts and being funny at the same time.

Maggie Gyllenhaal (The Deuce) – Gyllenhaal's performance as Candy evolved in season 2 into an even more interesting character. Her wonder and excitement at the path her career was taking, mixed with the fear of people finding out what she did for a living, made her into the most well-rounded character on the show.

Ian McShane (Deadwood: The Movie) – Deadwood fans finally got the sendoff that they waited for, for a decade. McShane has always been a powerhouse as Al Swearngen, but seeing Al at his most vulnerable was a perfect ending. McShane was criminally overlooked in his previous 3 seasons on Deadwood. Let's hope the academy makes things right this time and nominates him for one of the great TV characters of all time.

# “Sign Off: Caught Dead in Wyoming” Book 1

Patricia McLinn is a best-selling author with more than 45 published novels. Her works include mystery, historical romance, and woman's fiction amongst others.

It is not difficult to understand why this book's main character, E.M. Danniher, works in journalism; the author herself spent time as a newspaper writer and editor so has a volume of experience to cull from.

Elizabeth Margaret Danniher's ex-husband sends her to small time Wyoming after their divorce as a way of banishing her from the spotlight, and her prosperous life. Though the television station boasts the largest broadcast area in the state, her new job is only as a twice weekly consumer advocate for a small segment called "Helping Out."

During a second-grade school visit to the studio, one of the students approaches Miss Danniher and asks for her help. "You told people with problems to tell you and you'd help them." This child will most likely be denied parental visits with her father soon as he has been accused of murder. She needs Danniher to prove her father is innocent. This is the impetus that propels the plot of this novel - the disappearance, and possible murder of a deputy.

The author's knowledge of journalism, print and broadcast, is evident in her writing. But this is where the first chapter stymied me. I found the author's style disturbing and disjointed.

If it had not been that I needed a book to review I probably would not have gone past the first chapter. Fortunately, the book does improve.

But I thought the characters cliché. At the studio we have backstabbing co-workers, prima donna anchors, and an owner that leaves things to the anchor. We have infidelity, the requisite town gossip, a bumbling Sheriff, battling women of less

than a desirable nature who believe the missing man was in love only with them and planning to leave town only with them. You have the high school sports star who should have made good but decided he was happy where he was, living a low-keyed life. He marries a woman who thought he could provide her with a way out of town. Of course, she pretends she is pregnant so that she can get him to marry her, then mysteriously miscarries. The unsuccessful high schooler ends up making good. Cliché.

While her characters are less than imaginative, she describes them nicely. "Unmoved by the wind that stirred my hair into a froth, her artful disarray of streaked blond mane reached her shoulders and framed a face dominated by blue eyes."

Her visuals of the surrounding area and its comparison to her living quarters were equally vivid. "Black and deep purple cabbage roses swarmed over a background of vile green, which matched the tile in the bathtub surround."

Through her search for wallpaper in the hardware store we are given a clear indication of the size of the town. "After page after page of pink and blue bunnies with an occasional red and blue railroad train thrown in for variety, I realized both sample books were for nurseries."

What made this book worth reading was this type of colorful language that she sprinkled throughout to describe various elements of the story.

Would I recommend? Well, this was a decent enough summertime read. The action was fast paced. Language was a pleasure to become immersed in. And, there were plot twists that caught me off guard. If you are looking for something for free you might want to give this a try.

ally-minority individuals in employment, housing, public accommodations and other public services at a nationwide level. Should the bill become law it will open a path for social justice in hostile social structures.

In the meantime, there is an institution based in Lawrence, that provides support to youth from 16 to 25 years old, that are experiencing mental health challenges with a drop-in center in 15 Union St. You-Forward offers a welcoming and inviting home-like environment with a kitchen, a living room, a laundry and even bunks for the youngsters that are slipping through the cracks. This non-profit has a special focus on LGBTQ teenagers, which faces the most difficulties, providing one-on-one mentorship on assigned basis.

Initiatives like the previous mentioned, both with legislation and community-oriented, are necessary to provide safety to millions of residents, deserving of protection. Many of which don't perceive the feeling of being wanted or accepted,

showcase themselves too effeminate to be safe out the closet and carry stigmas around their sexuality and Who have the need to feel respect, dignity and due consideration in the full spectrum of society's public services, which should be provided to every citizen regardless of their sex, gender or sexual orientation. These are necessary steps to deter imprudent platforms like Grindr to proliferate at the expense of the LGBTQ community mental health, in such an unregulated manner. Being an application that facilitates sex as a sport, and not fulfilling relationships and congregations, needs to be acknowledged. Nonetheless, more participation is needed from families, friends and allies to pursue collective health and eradicate depression. "To heal toxic, self-harming and mal-adaptive defense mechanisms, on a personal basis, is just the first step" Therapist Wexelblat would say, in order to have a wholesome community that embraces all of its members. ♦

From transistor radios, she and her colleagues learned about the first landing of the moon and of the massive war protests back home. The women and men she served alongside, socialized and endured long hours of duty formed her view of the world which helped seal her conviction that war should be avoided at all costs. She was a young woman and she experienced bouts of sadness punctuated with laughter, excitement and hope for a limitless life ahead.

She was an unassuming reluctant hero, not because she defeated an enemy, but because she went to heal those who did. Her own healing from the traumatic aspects of her experience was muted when she returned to the states with strict orders

not to wear any insignia or uniform for fear of reprisals from the protesters. In some circles, these expectations were an example of our country's collective shame about the war.

50 years later, after a lifetime of service and reflection, Kathleen Benson of Newburyport, continues her personal mission to heal those who suffer. She is one of the volunteers for the 2nd Annual Veteran's Deep-Sea Fishing Trip from Newburyport. The event is organized in part to bring awareness about homelessness in the veteran community

all but destroyed the ethnic enclaves of Lawrence. Today Plainsmen Park is between Elm and Chestnut Streets on White Street. Located in the middle of the park is a large white stone dedicated to the men of the Plains neighborhood, who served their country with including three who died defending democracy; Corporal Samuel S. Fiacchino, Staff Sergeant Samuel L. Hatem, and Seaman First Class Americo Sessa, all young men from the Plains neighborhood who lost their lives during World War II. The monument was dedicated October 1974 by the Plainsmen Association.

Research on the Plainsmen Association brought me to the web site, "QueencityMA.com", and I found the information on Plainsmen Park's honorees there. Cpl. Samuel S. Fiacchino graduated from the Armored Force School at Fort Knox, Kentucky as a tank mechanic. He was killed in action with the Seventh Armored Division on December 12, 1944 in Germany.

Staff Sgt. Samuel L. Hatem died in a military accident while on maneuvers in Hawaii March of 1945. He was the first member of the State Guard to die in service during World War II. He was honored with a plaque installed in the State Armory March of 1945.

Seaman First Class Americo Sessa served in the US Navy during World War II. He was a member of the Armed Guard Gun Crew on a merchant vessel. His vessel failed to arrive in port at the expected date of April 28, 1944. The next day he was presumed dead and lost in the North Atlantic.

As for Iwo Jima? I used Kenneth Bingham's book, "Black Hell" to do some research. 110,000 Americans fought there, 6,821 died defeating the entrenched Japanese. Additionally, 26,040 were wounded, including Sgt. Tony De Fusco. Two Americans were captured and killed by the Japanese. Twenty-seven Americans received the Medal of Honor during the five-week battle. The only known photo a father and son fighting together on Iwo Jima is of Seabee Chief John Smith and

his son, John Jr. of the 5th Marines. John Jr. was killed in the fighting the day after the photo was taken. Chief Smith's other son Granville, also a Seabee, was wounded during the fighting earlier at Saipan and was sent home due to his wounds. One day after Iwo Jima was declared "secure" by senior Military Leadership, over 250 Japanese troops were killed after they launched a "banzai" type attack against Allied forces. One Seabee Battalion, Naval Construction Battalion 133, "the Kangaroos" lost 40 men killed in action, with another 142 wounded, and one missing in action.

Belleau Wood during World War I, Iwo Jima during World War II, the Chosen Reservoir of the Korea War, and Siege of Khe Sanh during the Vietnam War, are all considered sacred to US Marines. I was honored today, to listen to a concert, and have a cigar with two members of the Greatest Generation who survived one of the bloodiest battles in US History!

I'd like to encourage readers who are eligible to join, but who need more information on organizations such as the VFW, the American Legion, the AMVETS, the Marine Corp League, the Seabee Veterans of America, to contact these Veteran's Organization on line, call their town's VSO, or stop by a local post. Increasing membership rolls gives these organizations "strength in numbers" and protects the rights of all Veterans.

Accounts like @sudanmealprojectcharity or @sudanmealofficial began to share posts promising that if you shared this post as well, they would donate meals to Sudanese children and families. Any young person would look at these and say sure! What harm can be done in helping to provide better life quality and aid to all these people? Well, a lot - especially if you're not really helping to begin with.

The account @ExposingInstaScams, created by a young man in California, quickly popped up and began exposing all these fake Sudan aid pages and fake environmental projects. Even though this kid has managed to expose the truth behind many of these fake accounts and their untruthful postings, the question of why people keep feeding into these lies still stands.

With the rise of the internet, it has become much easier for the world to have a first look into the problems people face all over the globe.

One can also find safe, trustworthy, non-profits to donate supplies and money to in order to aid the people in their time of need. With all these helpful charities being so easily accessible, why do social media users still repost all these false advertisements? The simple, tried and true answer is the influence.

Most teens want people to look at their accounts and say, "Wow, this person is really amazing! They're really trying to make a difference in the world!"

In fact, many of my friends have reposted these unverified aid accounts and posts on their pages and stories. 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## An Imperfect Independence Denies A Doctor Basic Rights

This month, as the nation celebrates Independence from England, as my friend Kevin Leach correctly insists, we must also consider the sectors of the country where the founding principles are still observed only in the breach.

I have written here earlier about progressive Massachusetts' medical board coercing, on behalf of major employers, physicians to confess, in the classic progressive practice called "Criticism & Self-criticism," and forcing physicians to live without any income until they do so. Crony capitalism of course also has a long history in progressive regimes right from the start. My friend's mother was held hostage by progressives in the Hungarian Secret Police's basement prison for months until her husband signed over his supermarket chain to the people's commissar.

Which brings us to Dr. Sheikh in California's Central Valley, who was on course to completing her residency in family medicine and looking forward to entering a primary care practice. It so happens that Dr. Sheikh's husband had angered a Big Tech company by insisting on American laws being followed. The next thing that happened, seemingly all on its own, was a staff member at the public County hospital where she was a resident, suddenly sent her confidential personnel records over to the California Medical Board without her signed consent or any query initiated by the Board itself.

Dr. Sheikh's mentors in the training program had filed sworn affidavits attesting to her meeting California's 24-month training requirement and that she was entitled to being granted a medical license.

Rather than follow the law, however, a Board employee contrived to claim that Dr. Sheikh had not completed 24 months of residency training. This naturally was contrary to the facts, but when a doctor has been targeted by the swamp, that never matters. The denial of her license was apparently signed by a member of the Board who then denied to Dr. Sheikh that she had been anywhere near Sacramento

on that date. And Board staff repeatedly denied her request for a public hearing on the denial.

It has been ten years since Dr. Sheikh has been denied a public hearing at the Board, at state court, at federal district court and in the 9th Circuit court of appeals. A magistrate issued a subpoena to the Board to produce the evidence upon which the license was denied. The California Attorney General refused to comply and had the magistrate thrown off the case.

A second magistrate assigned to the case held a hearing and then again issued a subpoena for the documents. The second magistrate was also thrown off the case and a third magistrate issued an order agreeing with the Attorney General and the Board that they may deny a license and keep the documents secret. This third magistrate had officially not been assigned the case at all.

Dr. Sheikh did not receive equal protection in Federal courts either. California's Attorney General simply refused to turn over the documents and the judges all said Oh, OK!

Yes, gentle reader, this happened in the United States of America, some 230 years after Independence from England.

When you ask all the tenured law professors with guaranteed salaries and other luminaries, who routinely comment on the legal system, how such a thing could come to pass, they suddenly fall silent, lest they be forced to admit the truth that if some powerful entity, be it a politician, a district attorney or a corporation, targets someone, there is no system in place to ensure that the fundamentals of American fairness, the very principles that Washington and others risked their own lives for, will be respected even in the slightest.

Violet Amirault discovered that to her dismay here in Massachusetts, Attorney John O'Hara discovered that to his dismay in Brooklyn NY, and Dr. Sheikh has discovered that to her dismay in California.

And because all the tenured law professors with guaranteed salaries are loath to change this for the better, no improvement may be expected.

Birmingham Jail and you will see how civil rights leaders understood human rights to be based upon natural law. Like Augustine and Aquinas before him, MLK held that if any civil law contradicts natural law it must be resisted because, in essence, it is null and void. Rights are not granted by the state, or by our own selfish desires, but are inherent in the nature of the human being.

Therefore, the term 'good' must be understood to mean that which fulfills natural human inclination, enabling one to flourish, and contributing to the fulfillment of the individual, family, and society. Liberty means the freedom to do the good. We are not at liberty to contradict the basic tenets of natural law, despite any disordered desire or attraction to them, such as defying legitimate authority, killing the innocent (murder, abortion, euthanasia), lust and sex outside marriage (pornography, fornication, sodomy,

adultery), stealing, coveting, or lying. All these acts violate human nature and are human wrongs, not human rights. They diminish the well being of all. There is no "pride" in this.

We live in an increasingly divided and isolated nation. Only when we rediscover that independence from Britain does not mean independence from God, others, and human nature itself, will we stop the decline of what was once an independent country with great promise.


