#### SCHOOL DIRECTORS' REPORT.

The Board of School Directors met at the Town Hall on March 13th, 1906 and organized by electing E. E. Congdon Chairman and J. H. Davis Clerk for the ensuing year.

At a meeting of the School Directors on March 24, 1906, Mrs. Beatrice J. Walker was appointed Superintendent of Schools, and John W. Plumber Truant Officer for the ensuing year.

It was decided to have a spring term of 11, a fall term of 11 and a winter term of 10 weeks of school.

To comply with Act No. 54 of Acts of 1906 the Town should take some action in regard to that portion of the U. S. Deposit Fund (\$1781.55) now loaned to the town.

We would call the attention of the voters of the town to the school house in the northeast part of the town, known as the Spafford District, said school house in its present condition is decidedly unfit for use as a schoolroom and in our opinion it would be economy for the town to build new rather than to repair the old, as in the latter case it would have to be almost entirely new to bring it to the required standard for use as a schoolroom.

# School Superintendent's Report.

To the Citizens of Clarendon :

Being unable to visit your schools only the first part of the school year, can submit but a brief report for the year beginning April, 1906, and offer a few suggestions for the year, 1907.

Regret to learn that the per cent of attendance has been so very low in most of our schools during the entire year, and think this might be remedied, in part anyway, by the parents showing a more needed interest in our schools and attention being paid to our Truant Law by teachers and school officials.

Certain schools in town were unfortunate enough to have to change teachers several times during the year. Although this could not be avoided, it proved very detrimental to the welfare of the schools.

Find the one chief weakness in our teachers of today comes not from the lack of knowledge of special methods, as from the lack of special scholarship and the spirit of inspiration that goes with it.

Encourage our graduates to enter a Normal School and our officials in securing Normal graduates for our teachers.

The Normal Schools of today prefer its teachers to go forth with Socratic wisdom, and even those teachers who must administer the whole of the course of study in our primary grades, will be allowed to specialize in some one or two subjects of the curriculum.

Understand that we have been severely criticised by some of the Old School on account of devoting a short period each week to the teaching of drawing.

Would say that the up to date schools of today put special stress on the subject of drawing, and hope to see our teachers of the future show added interest in this important work.

I would begin—yes, in the first grade—the first simple lessons in pure design, drawing upon my knowledge of the child mind and childish interest, to keep in guiding his dawning sense of rythme, balance, and harmony.

Am pleased to see such an interest shown in the care of the grounds of some of our schools, by pupils and teachers, and the effort made by our directors to repair our school houses, etc., for to do better mental work, not more, and to do it easily, we need more wholesome school surroundings.

Without these surroundings there is the absence of the influence which inspire to higher conceptions of life, or ennoble or enrich human action.

This is an action brought by the town of Wallingford for the tuition for schooling Mary Johnson, Margaret Riley, Mary Riley and George Riley, from January 1901, to July, 1904, for which plaintiff claims \$113.50, and interest, and also for the schooling of Mary Johnson from the 1st day of April 1903 to the 1st day of July, 1904, for which it claims \$42, making \$155.

No contract for this schooling is claimed to have been made. The suit was returnable before Justice Farnsworth at Wallingford, April 24, 1906. No testimony was taken at that hearing; the only question being presented was the legal right of the town of Wallingford to recover. The justice held the town liable to recover for the first item above mentioned, and an appeal was taken by the town of Clarendon to the County Court. The question of the liability of the town will probably be heard at the coming March term, and it will then be determined whether the children of the town may go to any school they may select without consulting with the school directors, and without their consent, enable the town where the schooling is furnished to recover therefor without any contract or agreement in respect thereto.

3. To see if the Town will instruct the Selectmen to include the several taxes in one tax bill. Or if not all, what ones.

to see if the Town will vote to raise a tax on the Grand List for all necessary purposes for the ensuing year.

5. To see if the Town will vote to license the sale of intoxicating liquors.

6. To see if the town will vote to exempt from taxation for a period of five years the buildings, machinery and improvements of the Orvillo Marble Quarrying Company.

7. To see if the Town will vote to exempt from taxation for a period of five years the buildings, machinery and improvements of the Clarendon Marble Company.

8. To see if the Town will appropriate money for Permanent Highways in accordance with Sec. 8 of Act 111 of the Acts of 1906.

6. To see if the Town will vote to build a new School House in what used to be School District No. 5.

10. To transact any other necessary business.
