## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

*To the Honorable Board of School Directors:*

I am pleased to submit my second annual report of the schools in the town of Clarendon.

Seven schools have been maintained during the present school year.

Statistics relative to teachers and pupils are given below:

The teachers are:

Edith Spaulding, Flats School, qualification certificate; state aid per week, \$3.00.

Mabel White, Hill School, probationary certificate; state aid per week, \$3.00.

Ida Boynton, North Clarendon School, qualification certificate; state aid per week, \$4.00.

Stella Boutwell, Clarendon Springs School, probationary certificate; state aid per week, \$4.00.

B. Doris Ross, East Clarendon School, qualification certificate; state aid per week, \$3.00.

Beatrice Kirby, East Street School, probationary certificate; state aid per week, \$4.00.

Mrs. Ellen Potter, Chippenhook School, qualification certificate; state aid per week, \$3.00.

From the above figures it will be noted that there will be a state rebate of \$24.00 per week. This is on account of qualified teachers.

The attendance of pupils this year in the various schools has been excellent indeed and reflects much credit on the teachers, parents and all concerned.

As a whole you have a splendid corps of teachers in Clarendon and for the most part very substantial work is being done in the schools.

The school directors have given much time and interest for the general welfare of the pupils. At a school board meeting during the fall term it was decided, through the splendid co-operation of the board to make a thorough survey of the books needed in the several schools. Mr. Frank Teer and the superintendent looked over the books very carefully in every school. Mr. Teer put in two days of his time for this purpose. At the next meeting of the board it was voted to purchase certain needed books.

I am convinced that the members of the board are doing all they can in order to maintain the best schools possible through the employment of capable teachers. I spent a day with Mr. Teer at Castleton for the purpose of obtaining a teacher for Clarendon Springs and I am sure that the parents and pupils are well pleased with her and her services.

Two new teachers were engaged for the East Street School and North Clarendon by Mr. Page and Mr. White. The North Clarendon School has been very large, as will be shown by the above report, and it is a difficult position for any teacher, but I feel that Miss Boynton has made progress from the first.

It pays to retain good teachers even at a little more expense.

The citizens are willing to pay for good schools, but poor schools are costly at any price.

To maintain good schools it requires capable teachers, plenty of books, supplies and equipment. There is no question but that more reading material is needed in all of the schools. This does not, however, involve a great expense.

The Parent-Teacher Associations are doing splendid work in the renovation and equipment of many of the schools.



The schools at Clarendon Flats, North Clarendon and East Clarendon can be made "Standard" without a very great expense. This reflects great credit on these Associations.

In closing I want to express my gratitude and appreciation of the hearty support of the school directors, the substantial co-operation of parents and the industry of pupils and teachers during the past year.
